There is still time to enter the Curry Rivel Flower Show. You will be able to pick up an entry form from the Curry Rivel One Stop, Petrol Station, Sandpits Heating, Greenslade Taylor Hunt (Langport) and the Langport Library. You can also view the program online (see above).

The 2022 Show was very well attended, with free entry for kids and lashings of cream teas and cake. **But we do need people to enter the competition!** Post-pandemic we had the lowest number of entries ever, yet so many people could be heard to say... "Oh I could have entered my roses", "I could have baked a cake" or "Call those courgettes? You should see mine".

If nobody enters, the show will die. It only costs £1 to enter any number of classes, £1 to enter your roses, sweet peas, onion, painting, photos, etc.

So how do you enter?

Bring your completed entry form to the Curry Rivel Village Hall on Thursday 10th August, 6.30-8.30pm. For £1 you can enter any number of 89 competition classes. If you are under 17 you enter FREE......

There are 24 Vegetable classes, from the largest onion to unusual tomatoes. We have 25 Flower classes, lots of cut flowers and flower arranging. Soft fruit classes, Floral Art, Cakes and Jams, etc. You can enter the painting classes or a photo. There are classes for the young, who enter for free.

If you cannot enter on Thursday night, email us your entry, name, contact details and which classes you are entering, you can pay your £1 entry fee on Saturday morning.



What happens on the morning of the show?

Exhibitors should bring their entries to the Village Hall on Saturday 12th August, between 8-10.30am, all entries should be staged by 10.30am. If you have entered by email, remember to pay you £1 entry fee on Saturday morning. When you arrive on Saturday, you will be handed an entry card for every class you have entered and will be invited to stage your entries.

The Show will be open to the public 2.30-4.30pm.

Entry to the show is just £1, free if you are under 17.... so, bring the kids.

For every class there will a judged result, resulting in a 1st, 2nd and 3rd place. There are many cups and prizes for the various sections, which are given out in a short ceremony at the end of the show.

We have a delicious assortment of cakes to partake of with your cup of tea or coffee.

So come along and see if you agree with the judges' decisions.

Can You Help?

On the evening of Friday, 11th August the staging, tables and chairs are laid out in the Village Hall.

We would be happy to have some help, preferably help with a few muscles. Help is also needed to dismantle the staging on Saturday, 12th August, after the show.





In recent months l've had а couple about conversations

prayer. One was with someone who is just beginning to piece Christianity together, and another with someone who has heard a lot of 'things Christian' in their time. Both however were uncertain about prayer. Where is prayer directed; who is listening; and what difference does it make?

Well, an article like this isn't the place for detailed answers, but here's a start...

Christian prayer is not about inward gazing meditations seeking truth within, but rather about clear words addressed to the Creator of the universe through His risen and ascended Son Jesus Christ. It's not about saying the right words at the right time in the right way and in the right place, but rather it's about words spoken any time, anywhere, humbly and honestly from the heart, to an ever attentive God. And it's not about what we bring to the table - our IQ, our eloquence, our likable character, our high moral standards - but rather it's about an empty handed recognition that in our own strength we are weak, but in His, all things are possible. Perhaps this true story will help.

As the medical staff approached, Derek climbed to his feet. "It was animal instinct," he would later say. He set out hopping, pushing away the coaches in a crazed attempt to finish the race.

When he reached the final straight, a big man pushed through the crowd. He was wearing a T-shirt that read "Have you hugged your child today?" and a hat that challenged, "Just Do It." The man was Jim Redmond, Derek's father. "You don't have to do this," he told his "Yes, I do," Derek weeping son. declared. "Well, then," said Jim, "we're going to finish this together."

And they did. Jim wrapped Derek's arm around his shoulder and helped him hobble to the finish line. Fighting off security men, the son's head sometimes buried in the father's shoulder, they stayed in Derek's lane to the end. What made the father do it? What made the father leave the stands to meet his son on the track? as it the strength of his child? No, it was the pain of his child. His son was hurt and fighting to complete the race. So the father came to help him finish.

God does the same. When it comes to our prayers, they may be awkward. Our attempts may be feeble. But since the power of prayer is in the one who hears it and not the one who says it, our prayers do make a difference. Why not pray right now?

A View from the Orchard.....

August month: traditionally the month of holidays and vacations, trips to the seaside, days on the beach. Growing up in Cornwall summers consisted of full days on the beach. If we were going to the beach, we made a day of it and always with another family or two for company: towels, swimming costumes and if Granny was with us a cricket bat & tennis ball. My cousin briefly played cricket for England in the late 1980's and if we wondered where his talent came from, I reckon it was this grandmother.

Picture the cartoon Giles and you have the perfect pictorial caricature of Granny – short and squat. We would settle her folding chair in the sand and there she would sit in command of all proceedings. And there she would sit and bat when we played cricket; holding the bat in front of her there was no need for running between wickets, she could thwack a six with every hit! The only way to get Granny out was a catch fielders spread far and wide, in and amongst other folk trying to enjoy the beach; often a stranger with quick reflexes making the catch as the tennis ball came hurtling in their direction, coopted onto the team briefly so their catch counted.

My brother's churches are much closer to the seaside than ours here and during August they have arranged a 'Tide Fight': the building of sandcastles of varying shapes & sizes on the tideline and as the tide comes in the last structure to crumble and fall is the winner. Just a bit of fun - something everyone can take part in and I suspect even Granny would enjoy patting the sides of the sandcastle firm with her cricket bat. The Tide Fight reminds me of a story told by Jesus about wise and foolish folk: wise folk build their houses on rock (on solid foundations) whilst foolish folk build their houses on sand (without foundation) and when the rain comes (or the tide turns) the houses on the sand collapse; the houses on the rock stand firm. You may be familiar with the story told through the words of simple Sunday school song.

So, a question to ponder during August month: what is your 'house', your life-view, outlook, attitude or faith built upon? Solid foundations which will hold you firm in challenging times? Or something a little more wibbly, wobbly? When the 'tide turns', or the 'rain falls', my prayer is you will find yourself 'shored up' and supported by Love, Faith and Hope.

Somerset Wildlife Trust breaks new records in latest citizen science event, The Big Count 2023!

This June, Somerset Wildlife Trust hosted its biggest citizen science event of the year, The Big Count, and an incredible 1,400 people from across Somerset signed up to help the Trust learn more about their local wildlife.

The count took place between June $16^{th} - 25^{th}$, and this year was sponsored by Southern Co-op. It challenged participants to get outside and help collect vital information about the wildlife on their doorsteps, in their parks, and outside their schools and workplaces. An annual event, the count is part of the Trust's Great Somerset Wildlife Count initiative, which, launched back in 2021, is all about encouraging more people to connect with nature, while also asking them to gather important data on Somerset's wildlife — all with the help of iNaturalist, a popular site for wildlife spotting and identification.

The Trust first launched The Big Count last year, when just over 600 people took part and helped record nearly 1,000 records of species including goldfinches, butterflies, snails, and spiders. This year, the number of participants more than doubled, which, as Kirby Everett, Head of Communications at Somerset Wildlife Trust explains, is exciting news for both the charity and Somerset's wildlife:

"This is only the second year we've hosted The Big Count, and to see so much enthusiasm and desire to help Somerset's wildlife is absolutely fantastic. The data participants have helped collect will allow us to better understand some of Somerset's often underrated species, letting us know what is present, where, and how those populations might change over time. We're extremely grateful to everyone who took part in the event this year, as well as of course our wonderful friends at Southern Co-op for sponsoring this year's count and helping us make it such a success!"
