It is extraordinary into what diverse directions an advisory role can lead...

We were also privileged to have with us Gill Betty, chair of the county Creative Arts committee to judge the winner of our new competition, set up in memory of Sheila Sandifer, needlewoman extraordinaire. This was to make a cushion cover and member Gillian Neill carried the day with an enticing tapestry design featuring strawberries at the centre.



Our own new President, Anne Geach, then took up her role at the head of the meeting as we confirmed our support

for the two National Annual Resolutions. The first on encouraging the take up of cervical screening, but also widening access to screening to include younger women, and secondly to fight the decline in bus services especially in rural areas. Gardening Tips for June

- Remove the side shoots from tomatoes and feed after the first truss has set
- Stake tall floppy plants such as delphiniums before they fall over!
- Be WATER AWARE, collect rain water in water butts, put out pans and bowls when it rains to collect extra water. Use saucers under pots and troughs.
- The weather should be warm enough for hanging baskets and bedding plants to be outside now.
- Dead head roses, petunias etc regularly to keep them flowering all summer long.

ell, thankfully April brought us some better weather, lighter evenings, and a good turnout of members and guests for our April meeting! Before introducing our 'guest' it was a pleasure to announce that we have recruited a new Secretary and Treasurer of the Tuesday Group Committee, whose predecessors are stepping down after faithfully serving the group for several years.

We then welcomed Ann Fagan, a noted artist, who came to demonstrate the art of Lino Printing. She began by explaining how she first became interested in the process, having trained as a painter at Harrow and Hornsey schools of art, plus three further years at intermediate level resulting in a National Diploma in Design. She went on to specialise in painting and achieved her Art Teachers Certificate. Marrying a teacher, Ann went into teaching herself, but after her son was born the family moved to Kenya to teach at a boarding school. Returning to the UK after four years, Ann took a teaching post in Sussex where she stayed for the next 30 years! After moving to Somerset, she started printmaking again at the Dove Studio and Strode College. She showed many examples of her stunning and thoughtprovoking work, and cards and notelets of her prints were available for sale.

It was then time to get 'stuck in' and Ann demonstrated some simple

printing techniques inviting budding artists from the floor to have a go! Guess who 'cut' a shamrock?? There was a lot of interest and some amazing results!

Many questions from the floor continued while refreshments were served, and Ann explained that much of her work now is inspired by the Somerset landscape and is developed from observational drawings and her own photographs. Feelings of space and the patterns and textures made by land, trees, water and the birds in the sky are important elements of her work, and I think this was truly evident. Ann is a member of the Somerset Guild of Craftsmen and exhibits regularly in Somerset Arts Week.

Well, after such an inspiring evening, the group were reminded that the May meeting should be pure

News from Curry Rivel School

Frances Burns – Acting Headteacher

The first part of this term has flown by with a lot of notable activities happening at Curry Rivel Primary School. We started the term with a number of inter-school sports fixtures. Our netball team had successfully won through to represent our local Community Learning Partnership at a tournament against the best of each of Somerset's area teams. They played with real enthusiasm and should be very proud of what they achieved. As well as this event, our teams have taken part in football and cross-country events. Six of our children represented this area in the Somerset Cross Country competition. We are particularly proud of the excellent behaviour and teamwork displayed by all our children and commented on by sports leaders and organisers.

Our school aims are based around being a caring citizen, a curious learner and a confident individual. We give opportunities for the pupils to demonstrate the first in many ways. Last term, the children took part in many fundraising activities and, with the parents and friends, raised an amazing £1,110 for NSPCC. This term, we have visited the Village hall to sing to the Memory Cafe; set up our Eco Team with representatives from every class to find ways that we can be more environmentally friendly; and are now busy preparing for the Curry Rivel in Bloom displays later this the term.

This term's themes are based around geography and science. Phase One are studying the sea – its animal life, geographical facts, pollution and the physics of floating and sinking. We try to give the children as much practical and real experience as possible to help them link knowledge and research with their own observations. As part of this, the Phase One children are off to Lyme Regis for a day trip. In Phase Two, the focus is on being healthy – learning about how the human body works and the importance of diet, sleep, etc. This is leading to lots of interesting discussions and resolutions to be more healthy!

The energetic PTA supports the school in many ways, and we are very grateful for the fundraising they organise. We are now working on a long-term project to replace all of our climbing and outdoor play equipment as it has reached the end of its life. This type of equipment helps the children's physical fitness through strength and challenge, supports their

wellbeing and gives them a lot of fun and exercise. If anyone knows of any local charities that might be able to help us raise the estimated £30,000 that is needed, we would be very grateful for the information. It is a huge sum to raise but it is so vital for the children.






Letter to the Editor

Legion. It was founded 101 years ago in 1917 by ex-Servicemen, some of whom were back home recovering from wounds sustained during the First World War. It was not for another 19 years that the Branch received its first Standard in 1936. This Standard now hangs for safe keeping in St Andrew's Church, Curry Rivel. A second Standard was presented to the Branch in 1967 and dedicated by the Bishop of Taunton. It was this Standard that was laid-up recently in St Martin's Church, Fivehead.

A new Standard, paid for with generous public subscriptions, joined over 2,000 other Legion Standards last year at Ypres in Belgium to commemorate the ninetieth anniversary of the 'Great Pilgrimage' in 1928.

uring an Evening Service in St Martin's Church, Fivehead, the local Branch of the Royal British Legion handed-over its old Standard to the Vicar, The Reverend Scott Patterson "for safe keeping in this Holy Church for evermore."

The next Branch event this year will be 'Summer Drinks' at Hurds Hill by kind permission of Mr David Holmes and Mr Clifford Lee on the evening of Friday 21 June 2019. The Volunteer Band from HMS HERON at Yeovilton will play incidental music. Tickets, priced at £10 each, will go on sale from Saturday 1 June 2019. Most oblige, although, on that occasion, not everyone could bring themselves to do so. Some felt the need to continue texting throughout the film, one even taking a call. Inconsiderate? Well yes.

But I don't expect you are too surprised. The need to be constantly 'in touch' seems to be gaining an ever stronger grip on many. Try chatting to almost any (although not exclusively) young person today, and the chances are their phones will be beeping in the background alerting them that a text, email, Twitter or Facebook message has just arrived. One eye may be on you, but the other will be drawn to the device, their attention divided. Perhaps many of us could well do with a little 'down-time' from that demanding little companion.

It's not just phones that need switching off from time to time though, we do too. We need to rest both for our good and for the good of others. We may think we can power-on forever like Duracell bunnies – our capacity to keep going unlimited, and our energy reserves superior to everyone else's but in reality, we can't. I know that recently I have got rather too close to the 'edge' in this matter, and have needed to reassess the way I do things and acknowledge my need for greater It was Frodo Baggins in support. Tolkien's The Lord of the Rings who, bearing the great weight of the 'one ring', spoke of feeling like: "too little butter spread across too much bread." This phrase resonated with how I felt; perhaps you know it to be true of you?

In the book of Genesis at the beginning of the Bible, we find the accounts of creation. In chapter 2 verse 2 we read: 'And on the 7th day God finished the work that he had done, and rested on the 7th day from all the work that he had done'. A View from The Orchard

In October last year another attack at a Synagogue in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, eleven people were killed and seven injured.

In New Zealand in March two mosques were attacked; at the Al Noor Mosque forty-two were killed and at the Linwood Islamic Centre another seven were killed; another died later at Christchurch Hospital.

In Sri Lanka in April over three hundred people were killed in bomb attacks aimed at Churches and Hotels. The Sri Lankan Prime Minister was reported as saying it is possible the Sri Lankan bombings were a response to the Christchurch mosque attack.

So now what? A Christian militant group seek to avenge the outrage in Sri Lankaand then......I have used this quote before but it is very appropriate to use it again now,

'An eye for an eye makes the whole world blind' (Ghandi).

Why does faith make some people react so strongly? Do they seriously believe that their god rejoices at an action which violently takes people's lives?

Christianity is the way I found God. The Christian faith is about a living relationship with God based on Easter's message of new life experienced through Jesus. It is both joyful and unique but does not need defending by the act of denying the reality of another's faith.

Engaging in dialogue is not always easy; we may not understand why someone should follow another faith path or why there are those for whom any idea of faith is preposterous. We may not always feel comfortable discussing our faith, yet alone should we need to defend it, but here's the rub, we should not feel a need to defend Christianity any more than we have a need or right to attack another's expression of faith. The most preposterous thing of all is that we should wage war in the name of the one who's very rising to life is the central focus of our faith. The values of Christianity can demand a great deal from us; are we able to face those challenges and honour and respect those whose lives take a different path?

This is one of the most dramatic shipwreck disasters on an English shore. Drawing on his recent prizewinning book of the same name, he will describe the terrible events that shocked the nation when a huge East India Company ship was wrecked on the Purbeck coast. On board were the Captain's teenaged daughters, his nieces and several other young ladies, bound for India in search of rich husbands. Despite the dramatic rescue of some of the crew, Captain Pierce and all the young ladies were drowned. In 1786, the peculiar circumstances of this disaster caught the public imagination and filled the newspapers for weeks. More than two centuries later, the story of the Halsewell still has the power to move us.

Copies of the book will be on sale after the talk at the discount price of £10. In July, it won the Hall & Woodhouse Dorchester Literary Festival Writing Prize 2018. Philip Browne was born and educated in Ireland, graduating from Trinity College Dublin with a B.A. and a Higher Diploma in Education. He taught English in a Dublin secondary school before
