Gardening Tips for May

- Pinch out tops of sweet peas to make them bushier
- Feed tomatoes after the first truss sets. Don't over feed though!
- Grow French marigolds next to tomatoes to keep white fly away
- Keep on top of weeds and use mulch to keep them away
 - Pick slugs and snails off plants and veg by hand (wear gloves) go out at night with a headtorch, you'll be surprised how many you will find!

Volunteer to mentor disadvantaged children

ave you ever wondered what would be the best way to help children who are living in difficult circumstances? Most of you reading this lead comfortable lives. But there are hundreds of children across Somerset growing up in families which are struggling to cope, due to unemployment and a wide range of personal problems.

Research shows that providing a mentor for a young person from a disadvantaged background can make a significant difference for them. PROMISEworks is a Somerset charity which recruits, trains, matches and supports local volunteer mentors, each of whom then builds a close, long-term relationship with a disadvantaged youngster.

When asked about their own experiences, the responses of the young people have been heart-warming: "She takes the stone from my heart", and "Mentors are like pillars. If they weren't there the roof would fall in".

We have more than 60 mentors already operating in Somerset and are looking to double this number over the next year or so. Many of the children and young people we support are on the edge of, or have recently left, the care system.


The rainbow got its name from its shape. Its arc resembles a bow that's used for shooting arrows.

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Searching for Franklin's crew...

LANGPORT & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY EVENT REPORT Apr 2019

n 1st April, at the Society's new home at Huish Academy, Jeremy Michell, Senior Curator of Maritime Technologies at the National Maritime Museum, presented a fascinating insight into British expeditions to find a North West Passage through the Arctic, and the present day attempts to reconstruct what happened to Sir John Franklin's ill-fated 1845 expedition.

He began by sketching the context of the times. There was pressure on the government of the day to make more use of the Navy - an expensive but skilled force - to survey the Arctic, where there were over 900 miles of unexplored sea routes. Russia had begun to explore the Arctic, and Britain wanted to assert its position and claim sovereignty first. The Canadian based Hudson's Bay Company also wanted to map the area and exploit the beaver population for their pelts. For a time there was a monetary prize for finding a north-west route to the Pacific.

Sir John Franklin had led several landbased expeditions before he came to lead a ship-based exploration. Previous seaborne explorations under the command of Sir John Ross, Sir William Parry, and James Clark Ross (Sir John's nephew) had succeeded in mapping and producing charts of much of the area, but without finding the elusive passage.

Thorough preparations for Franklin's expedition included making special adaptations to the ships HMS Erebus and HMS Terror and trialling them in the Antarctic before they set off from Greenhithe in Kent in May 1845. They were last seen by Europeans in Baffin Bay in July 1845.

With no news, searches were dispatched in 1848, but for over 5 years they brought back nothing. It wasn't until Sir John Rae started interviewing Inuit people that the story of their tragedy began to emerge. His mention of the possibility of cannibalism caused

a scandal which unfortunately overshadowed the detail of his report. However, the recent Canadian discovery of the wrecks of both ships has brought the story of Franklin's expedition back to prominence, and the collaboration between Canadian and British museums promises to reveal even more of their sad story.


Jeremy's use of archives, especially ships' plans and contemporary letters; his encyclopaedic knowledge and his enthusiasm for the subject gave the audience a fascinating glimpse into the world of 18th and 19th century polar exploration, as well as into how modern museums research and conserve material that helps our understanding of our history.

enthralled by the vast pearl markets. She learnt to string pearls and now sells her work in addition to giving talks and running 'Pearls before Wine' holidays at her home in France. Frances talked of the history of pearls, the science of their development and mischievously shared the best way to keep your pearls shining. Pearls are judged by their rarity, size and perfection. Imitation pearls are less robust with real and cultured pearls the best choice.

Yvette Milliner and Georgina Rutter joined our April meeting to share with us the work of the Jemima Layzell Trust. Jemima was a vibrant young girl who died suddenly aged 13 as the result of a brain aneurism. She loved flowers often wearing one in her hair and to mark Yvette's visit our members arrived wearing a flower or small corsage. Knowing Jemima's thoughts her family readily agreed to the donation of her organs, enabling eight people to survive and achieve an improved quality of life. At the time of her death this was the largest number of people who had benefited from the organ donation of one individual. The trust supports the

work of BIBIC also donating equipment to other hospitals and institutions enabling more than one person to benefit. Members readily joined Yvette in discussing the merits of organ donation, the implications of society opting into organ donation rather than opting out and happily embraced her challenge 'Can you identify the position in your body of your main organs'? Of course we did!!

Recently eleven of us took part in an afternoon of Curling, others have enjoyed lunch and a conducted tour of the Smokery at Hambridge and the

walking group visited Chard Reservoir. Several members joined other local WI groups for a lunch competition afternoon at North Curry where Neta won a prize for her Easter bonnet. A busy month concluded with four of our members ioining with other Somerset WI members on a coach tour to Derbyshire including visits Holmfirth, Bakewell,



Chatsworth House and Buxton. This was much enjoyed in spite of the weather!

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


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Tuesday Group

ery remiss of me, but I missed last month's deadline, so this Report covers our February and March meetings!

February brought us Hazel Morris to encourage us out of our winter stupor, and she led a most entertaining evening of Line Dancing. To start with she taught us a fairly simple routine, then to show what can be achieved, gave a demonstration of a more advanced dance routine with three experienced members of her weekly 'class'. The rest of the group watched in awe, enjoying the performance immensely, and after rousing applause, were subjected to yet another routine to learn!?!?!?!? Aaaargh!

After a few bumps and clashes, mild expletives and much laughter, we danced our way to tea and coffee, ending a very enjoyable evening!

Thanks again to Hazel, who subsequently decided to become a member of the Tuesday Group! Yee ha!

March brought something quite different! Alex Morrice has been researching many characters from history, looking at them as people rather than just the historical relevance, and on this occasion he enlightened us all with Lady Emma Hamilton, the person.

We learned that Emma was renowned for her relationship with Nelson, but there was so much more to her life than that. Emma Lyon was born in 1765 in Denhall on the Wirral to a Blacksmith father who was illiterate. He died shortly after she was born and her mother then took her back to North Wales. At the age of 10 she was a nurse maid, moved to London at 12 as an under housemaid, at 15 was 'working' at Mrs Kelly's in Arlington Street (no surprise as to what sort of 'work' that was!) and in 1781 at the age of 16 was installed in a small house on a large estate. She was soon abandoned and put out on the streets by the landlord, and was now pregnant. An earlier acquaintance took pity on Emma and moved her into lodgings, visiting her from time to time, but her child was to be brought up by her grandparents. In 1783

Sir William Hamilton visits London and meets Emma, now 18 and a true beauty, and at 21 she moves to Naples with him, and they marry in 1791. Emma now has a good life, speaks 5 languages and is a beautiful singer.



However, when Nelson arrives in Naples after the Battle of the Nile, Emma nurses him back to health and they subsequently become lovers. Emma becomes a great friend of Queen Maria and with her command of languages helps the Queen to be one step ahead of her enemies by translating despatch letters sent back and forth at the time, providing a vital service and uncovering the enemies plans. With this insight the Royal family were able to eventually escape secretly with Nelson, avoiding the enemy's advance. Emma became pregnant with Nelson's child. Unfortunately the people who supported their relationship were of no standing, but those who supported Nelson's wife were very influential, so when Nelson died Emma was left very exposed.

Emma returned to England with her daughter, but despite the pleading of Queen Maria, was never accepted into an English court by the English Queen, and Emma gradually fell on hard times. Sadly, therefore, Emma's achievements in life did not sustain her, and she died impoverished. A very sad end to a fascinating life!

In April we will be exploring our craftiness, with Lino Printing! I shall report on the success or failure next time!

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
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



Lewis: "Christianity, if false, is of no importance, and if true, of infinite importance, the only thing it cannot be is moderately important." So firstly *Alpha* is for anyone who thinks Christianity is moderately important. This is an opportunity to come to a conclusion either way.

Alpha is also for the spiritual seeker. Today many have rejected the Bible and the Church as irrelevant and have turned instead to alternatives such as mindfulness, or the spirituality of yoga, or are exploring New Age Spirituality. But could it be that, in rejecting Biblical Christianity, the richest possible spirituality has been inadvertently rejected? Alpha will help explore this.

To quote a friend who had just experienced *Alpha* for the first time: "It's just so clear, I wish I'd heard it all 30 years ago!" Will you take this opportunity?

'Beating the boundary' goes back to medieval times, when a 'beating party' walked the boundary of a parish, checking the boundary markers and beating them with long sticks, also praying for the protection of the land.
