On Friday 27 July Ed's family, friends, supporters and the Press gathered at Home Farm, Chilthorne Domer (the School In A Bag Headquarters) from 9.30 am eagerly awaiting his arrival. Ed set off from this very spot back in March 2015. There was a real festive atmosphere and plenty to occupy the waiting time with the band 'K'fuffle' playing on stage, delicious homemade cakes and refreshments for sale, an ice

cream van and a burger van. There was the opportunity to donate and fill a school bag, to look at some of the discarded and worn out kit from Ed's trip (tyre, saddle, pedals etc), a commemorative book (with many photos from Ed's trip) for people to write congratulatory messages to Ed and a most entertaining video with congratulations messages from friends, family and many of the people that Ed met on his travels around the world.

## Where's Ed To?

E ven on his last night, Ed took the time to post a message on Facebook showing that he remained faithful to his true spirit of adventure by wild camping in a field! Ed travelled over 22,000 miles (4,000 more than the original plan) through 4 continents raising over £300,000 for the local charity School In A Bag. Ed's initial target of £18,000 (£1 per mile cycled) has been vastly exceeded thanks not only to the generous donations of Ed's loyal blog and social media followers, but also by a huge donation from an American guy called Brad, whom Ed had the pleasure of meeting in Texas. Brad unicycled across the USA 40 years ago when he was just 24. He originally said he would donate \$100,000 to SIAB but when he met Ed he was so inspired that he increased the donation to \$370,000! WOW!

Around 11 am the crowds started gathering at the entrance to Home Farm with cameras at the ready. We 'practised' making as much noise as possible prior to Ed's arrival, with cheering, horns and whistles. The excitement grew and when Ed finally arrived at 11.30, riding his unicycle of course, the noise made by the crowd was deafening. The look on his face as he saw the hundreds of people cheering to welcome him home was of genuine surprise and absolute delight. The first people to welcome him home were of course his Mum, Roxane, and his sister, Samantha. Dad Nick had already gone to meet Ed earlier along with several friends to ride the last few miles with him (on those strange two-wheeled things they call bicycles!)

After a few minutes of photo opportunities and Ed still having enough energy to run round the crowd (without the unicycle) and high-fiving everyone, he rode (yes again) round to the stage and was welcomed by 'K'fuffle' singing 'Bat out of Hell' which Ed had requested and joined in with, and of course a good bottle of Somerset cider was on hand to help with the celebrations.

Ed was interviewed by BBC Radio Somerset on stage and said he was overwhelmed by the response to his adventures and the amount of people here to welcome him home. There were inevitably highs and lows on the trip with one of the best bits being Kyrgyzstan as Ed stayed there for 7 months due to the weather making it too dangerous to travel. During that time he taught English in a school and he was able to see the same faces for a while instead of the transient life which he had previously encountered. Ed had a whole series of individual interviews lined up with various newspapers and TV stations and he announced that two questions were definitely banned - the first being 'How do you feel?' and secondly 'What are you going to do next?' All in good time... Before leaving the stage Ed thanked everyone for supporting his ride and said he felt supported even though he was on his own a lot of the time.



Brian Edwards, Mike Mason (Staff Photographer) and I, representing the Curry Rivel News, were given our own timeslot (just 5 brief minutes) to interview Ed. We asked him about his favourite country to ride through - China as it was so varied and he spent 6 months riding there. He really enjoyed the simplicity of riding through the desert as navigation was easy. Ed told us that the most dangerous country to ride through was the USA due to the amount of traffic and there was no hard shoulder. We asked was it a problem managing to always have food and water with him. Ed tried to carry as much as possible but he was taken aback by the generosity of people on the road who stopped to help him and give him provisions. I asked Ed what he was most looking forward to doing now he was home - 'having one or two glasses of cider with my mates'(!)

It was a lovely event with a fantastic atmosphere and so well organised by School In A Bag, Eventbrite and of course by Ed's family and friends. Brian, Mike and I felt privileged to be there to share in this wonderful moment of history, a world first.

An exceptional achievement by a truly exceptional young man. Chapeau Ed!

#### Binning it

Did you know that the community, through the Parish Council, spends a considerable amount of your money on the installation and maintenance of litter and dog waste bins for the benefit of all within the community? Despite this investment it appears that some dog owners do not know how to use these receptacles and; notwithstanding that they actually take the time and make the effort to pick up after their dog, they decide that the best place for the bag is within a hedge or hanging from a tree. I would like to take this opportunity to highlight the fact that every council provided bin and dog bin is a suitable location to deposit your dog poop bag. Please be considerate of your neighbours and the wider community by bagging it and depositing it in the bins that are provided for this very purpose. Please note that the bins provided by the BP garage and the bin outside Onestop should not be used to deposit your bagged dog poop.

#### **Planning Application**

The recent planning application for 27 houses north of Stanchester Way: It is quite clear from the responses on the Planning Website, and the general feeling through conversation, that the local opposition to this development is undiminished; however, the Parish Council had no planning grounds to object to this planning application and consequently supported the application. Nevertheless, we have made a number of suggestions regarding the development and these are in keeping with our response to the local plan consultation which was submitted in Jan 18. It is very evident that the housing shortage may have an impact on our village and our local surrounding area in the medium to longer term and we therefore consider that our views should be consistent with our aims and determination not to become a dormitory village. I think we must fight hard to build a sustainable village and any new housing should be balanced with new employment opportunities. This would also satisfy the carbon footprint argument, building employment opportunities within the local community will ensure that people have a place to live and work thus reducing the dependence on the car for work. We cannot stand in the way of change, but change needs to be managed to retain the right balance. As reported in the last newsletter Ric Pallister has resigned as leader of South Somerset District Council. I can now confirm he has been replaced by Val Keitch. Cllr Keitch is the Liberal Democrat representative for Ilminster Town and Area West chairman. She recognises the Council, in line with all local authorities, is facing very challenging times but added how privileged she feels to have been selected to lead the authority. The next District elections will be held in May 2019 so she has just under a year to make a difference.

The Adopt a Path scheme is open to anyone in Somerset whether you are a walker, horse rider or cyclist, and almost any public right of way can be adopted. Volunteers are simply asked to use their

chosen path as often as they can and report any problems they come across. If they want to, they can also help with some light maintenance, with equipment provided. The first concert of the new season will take place on Saturday 15 September 2018 at 7pm in St Andrew's Church Curry Rivel when we will welcome The Kosmos Ensemble.

This ensemble of very talented young artists comprises Harriet MacKenzie, Violin, Meg Hamilton, Viola and Milos Milivojevic, Accordion. They are an internationally acclaimed group which have twice won the Selected Artists accolade from Making Music. They are all soloists in their own right.

Harriet MacKenzie is an international concerto soloist who has performed across five continents. Recordings include concertos with the Royal Philarmonic Orchestra, Orchestra Nova and the English Symphony Orchestra. She has performed as a soloist at the Amsterdam Concertgebouw, Wigmore Hall, Budapest Marble Hall, and the Purcell Room amongst others. She has performed for Curry Rivel Music in

Meg Hamilton gained an Honours degree in Music at Edinburgh University in 2003 and a performance diploma at Trinity College of Music. Her music covers intensive study of music from

# Poppies for Remembrance Day Knitted and home made

We are hoping to have hand knitted poppies and poppies made from plastic bottles on display around the village. To make a plastic poppy, cut any plastic bottle in half using scissors, then cut down to the base in four equal divisions, some bottles have a base with four dips in them so use those a guide. Shape the petals, adjusting the length and flatten out your poppy, pressing the centre and petals into shape. Paint with red gloss paint, paint the middle black or glue on a black button. Use florist's or gardening wire to make a stem. Knitting Poppies. There is a good pattern at

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# **Fund Raising for the RNLI**

iving in the middle of Somerset you may be forgiven for ■ not paying too much attention to the RNLI - unless perhaps you visit the coast regularly or are a sailor yourself however casting your minds back to the February-March floods of 2014 you may remember the involvement of the Burnham-on sea lifeboat locally ferrying folk to and from Muchelney. Established in 1824, the RNLI website puts their mission statement very simply: "with your support we save lives at sea". However it is not as simple as that. Alongside the provision of 24-hour volunteer lifeboat search and rescue the RNLI also provide beach lifeguards, are involved with water safety initiatives and flood rescue in the UK and Internationally.

Separate from the coast guard, independent of the Government, the RNLI relies on volunteers and supporters to function. In 2017 it cost £176.5 million to fund the 238 life boat stations, to train volunteer lifeboat men and women,

provide and keep shore facilities and equipment (from boots to boats) well-maintained, to train and provide lifeguards to patrol 249 beaches through the summer, plus responding to local and international flooding emergencies. Recognising the charitable status of the RNLI (and the part they played in the Somerset floods of February and March 2014) Curry Rivel URC have chosen to support "ordinary people doing these extraordinary things" by giving all monies donated at our Harvest Charity Lunch to the RNLI.

To that end we invite anyone wishing to help support and raise funds for the RNLI to lunch with us on SUNDAY 23rd September in the URC Hall between 12 noon - 2pm. If you wish to donate but are unable to attend you can send your donation to our Treasurers c/o Stoney Cottage, Stoney Lane, Curry Rivel. All are welcome.

Has it been a while since you have been to church? It is absolutely true that you do not have to go to church to be a Christian, but on the other hand a Christian is a follower of Jesus, and Jesus expected his followers to follow. not on their own, but together as a church family. His intention was that his people could then encourage one another, teach one another, challenge one another, support one another, love one another, serve one another, and so on.

# "Don't write about me".

I had just shared my intention to go and write the **Pillowtalk** column. "But it's always been about or inspired by you."

"Well at least don't write anything embarrassing."

Anything embarrassing: with a teenager that's quite a tough call — everything seems at some point to be embarrassing: my getting on the school bus ("don't ever do that again; that was soooo embarrassing!"), public shows of affection ("you're embarrassing me"), getting cool & down with her friends (definite no no). It's sort of amusing.

However, the dictionary definition is more sobering: **embarrass** verb to make (someone) feel shy, ashamed, or guilty about something. These are not emotions I wish to engender within my daughter; being shy, ashamed or guilty are not comfortable places to be — leading potentially to awkwardness, anxiety or having a 'bad feeling' about oneself. These are not what I wish for her.

As much as I have enjoyed writing this column over the years (around 6 years or so now), perhaps now really is the time to stop before it becomes uncomfortable and simply too embarrassing for my daughter.

**Pillowtalk** has provided a wonderful opportunity to see and explore the world through a child's eyes; to witness my own growing through her challenges; to reflect on how her rites of passage have been transitions for me too; to come to understand my own mother in the light of being a mother myself; to catch my breath at the depth and simplicity of a child's wisdom – to fully appreciate the phrase 'out of the mouth of babes'; . . . . . .
