Welcome to the First Edition

There have been many occasions when our community has needed a parish newspaper. A simple straight forward means by which everyone - young, old, families who have lived here all their lives and those who have recently arived could be better informed about the issues and events that affect us.

It did not come as a surprise to the Parish Council when last year the Parish Appraisal Survey identified a need for better ways of finding out what is going on. You told us that you would support a parish newspaper.

Well this is the result - the first edition of **The CURRY RIVEL NEWS**. The Parish Council set up the Curry Rivel News Group to organise and publish a monthly newspaper and during the last few months that is what has been done.

The newspaper is paid for by the sale of advertising space, some funding by the Parish Council, and initially a start-up grant from the Somerset Rural Development Area Community Chest. At this stage it is still something of an experiment. There is sufficient money available, if we get the continuing support from our advertisers, to publish **The CURRY**

RIVEL NEWS until March 1997. If it is to continue after that date it will be because it has done something worthwhile and useful and equally important, you are giving it your support.

We would like the success of **The CURRY RIVEL NEWS** to be measured against the following objectives:

- a publication reaching all parishoners, creating an interest in the community and bringing people closer together.
- a publication that will generate interest and support for the whole range of Clubs and Societies that are available to us and so increase our enjoyment from living in Curry Rivel.
- a publication which you will use to tell us your views and opinions - not just what you want, but what you can put into making Curry Rivel a good place to live.

The one thing we won't do is get involved in Party Politics - either by giving space to simplistic party-political opinions or by promoting in any way their activities.

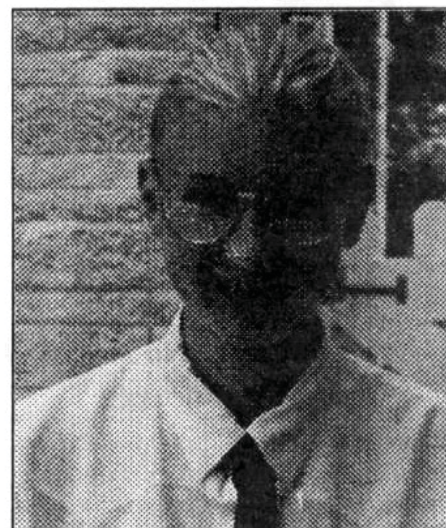
NEW YOUTH CLUB ?

All residents in the Parish are welcome to attend and at each meeting the opportunity will be available for you to raise any matters which you would like to bring to the attention of the Parish Council.

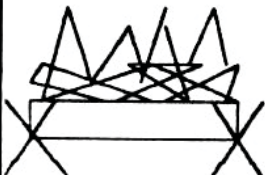

One Stop - the community shop?

One Stop took over the village grocery store, formerly owned by Mr David Macey, in February of this year. Their arrival was not greeted with overall enthusiasm by the villagers.

Principle complaints are that prices have risen, the range of groceries has diminished, basic lines are often out of stock and there is more emphasis on convenience type food. The new counters make shopping difficult because they are much higher and people find it awkward placing their baskets at this height. Several villagers have complained about the sale of newspapers and magazines and particularly the "girlie" mags.

The late opening hours did not meet with much approval either. During the first week of the new hours a large, heavy, advertising sign disappeared from outside the shop and has not been seen since. The company applied to instal sliding automatic doors and illuminated signs but the

proposals were rejected by the Parish and District Councils on the grounds of safety and unsuitability.

The store's manager and his staff, who have been sympathetic to many of the complaints were joined at the store's official opening in July by Ms Debbie Cox from head office. Several villagers came in to voice their opinions on the new store to Ms Cox. She promised to pass these comments on to the appropriate people.

When asked to comment on some of the criticisms she said "The product range that is on offer is very good. Newspapers are a major part of the company's business. One Stop, operates through 130 stores and the product range does not vary throughout, the only factor considered being space. On the question of price" she said "we are competitive."

Could it be that One Stop have not got their marketing right? Curry Rivel is not a suburb of a large town or city with a giant superstore 5 minutes up

the road. There are many people in the village who rely on a well stocked and sensibly priced grocery store, particularly the elderly and those without transport. An independent retailer like their predecessor is more able to tune his business to the local needs than a group with 130 outlets. Are One Stop prepared to make an exception of Curry Rivel and offer a full range of groceries at sensible prices and not compromise that range by offering products already available elsewhere in the village? If they do not it is difficult to foresee One Stop succeeding in Curry Rivel.

THE START OF ANOTHER PRIMARY SCHOOL YEAR

Now that the summer holidays are nearly over and the teachers have had the chance to recover, the governors would like to take this opportunity of telling you what's happening in Church Street in September.

As most parents will be aware, the school takes a major step forward with the establishment of a seventh class in September. At the time of going to press we are not entirely sure what the situation is as far as the new classroom is concerned. The current mobile classroom, a two bay unit, is due to be replaced, and we have been allocated a three bay unit, i.e. a single classroom, which is due to be delivered in the October half term. If the school roll is above a certain level, we will be allocated a five bay unit, are you still with me?

Those quick thinkers amongst you will have realised that the school is going to be short of one classroom at the start of the year, and potentially for the whole year. Fear not - your children will not be condemned to lessons in the playground in the deep mid winter. In the short term the school will utilise the library space but all interested parties at the school are lobbying the powers that be to ensure a successful outcome to this matter and achieve what is needed, the five bay classroom.

We welcome Paget Campion to the school in September when she takes up her position as 'the new teacher'. We hope she finds her new role challenging and enjoyable.

IT'S TIME TO SIGN ON....

Over 100 classes are being offered for the Autumn term at Huish Episcopi Community Education, including a wide selection of vocational and non vocational courses.



Examination courses include R.S.A. Word processing and Typing, Red Cross First Aid courses and one - year 'A' level and G.C.S.E. courses. The non vocational classes, which last for ten weeks and often continue into the Spring term, include a variety of exciting art and craft courses, cookery, dancing and languages. New classes include - Russian, Meteorology, Papier Mache, Guitar, Basic Electronics, Candle Making, Textile Design, Millinery, Garden Design, Beauty Care and many others.

Most of the classes take place at Huish Episcopi School, during the evenings, but there a number of day classes at Somerton, and for the first time, at Drayton.

All the classes are taught by well qualified and dedicated tutors who
