CROSSING PATHS A TRAGIC COINCIDENCE FOR THE PARISH?

PASSCHENDAELE 100 Years On

The seven men whose names, photographs and information appear on this page are all linked by the following: they were all directly connected to the Parish of Kingsbury Episcopi—and they were all killed at the Battle of Passchendaele during the three months from the end of July to November of 1917. However, their military records show that they belonged to different regiments—and one of them had even enlisted in the Australian Infantry. That this should happen, even in the random turmoil of war, is quite remarkable.

In this tragic coincidence did any paths cross? Did Leonard Say, born in 1891, of the Manse, Mid Lambrook, and who emigrated to Australia in 1911, meet up with James Henry Lovell Reed of Riverview born in 1898? Did Vincent Harvey from Crate Cottage next to the Wyndham, serving in the Durham Light Infantry, cross paths with either of the above? Or indeed with Albert Edward Male of Sunshine Cottage, Stembridge, serving in the Royal Garrison Artillery? They were born in the same year of 1898. Did they nod an acquaintance? Did they have a smoke and brew together? Did they reminisce about the Parish and its people, and their shared origins? their schooling? Did Vincent Harvey, born in the same year as Leonard Say, see him and recognise him? Did Howard Willy of Dudmoor House, meet up with Walter Talbot of Glencoe, their homes just some 200 metres apart in their village of Kingsbury Episcopi?

The Battle of Passchendaele, 31 July - 10 November 1917, as part of the Third Battle of Ypres, was infamous not only for the scale of casualties but also the atrocious battlefield conditions. A century later, the Battle of Passchendaele is remembered as a symbol of the worst horrors of the First World War, for the sheer futility of much of the fighting, and for the disregard by some of the war's senior leaders for the lives of the men under their command.










Archiving the Parish & its people, past & present

OUR HERITAGE LOTTERY BID

A little while ago we submitted an outline proposal to the Heritage Lottery Fund – First World War – Then & Now. We are now submitting a full bid following their response. We might or might not be successful. Our bid contains a number of inter-related elements. Each of these elements could be considered to be good things to do in their own right. In total, we feel they would offer far greater potential for the Parish's community. Together with the Centenary Commemorative Plaques and the Heritage Trails outlined above, we will be bidding for ways and means of making the ideas and content of the Trails available and accessible for a wide range of users. Display and hard-copy materials along with a website will form part of our bid. The bid will include workshops with the Kingsbury Episcopi Primary School and an adult education programme introducing using and accessing military & family records.

Our bid has been designed and developed with the participation of: direct descendants of those men killed: WW1 and Ancestry researchers with many years experience: other people from the Parish with a detailed knowledge and understanding of its people, geography, history and culture. The ideas contained in the bid have been presented to a community-wide audience, during the launch week for the opening of the new Kingsbury Episcopi Community Centre April 2017.

PLAQUES IN PUBLIC PLACES – A HERITAGE TRAIL

Centenary Commemorative Plaques

We have approached and sought the support of: The Parish Council, Kingsbury Episcopi Primary School, St Martin's Church, The Methodist Church, The Kingsbury Episcopi Community Centre, The Mid-Lambrook Meeting House and St. James' Church - to place a 100 years' commemorative plaque within the fabric of their buildings. The plaque would be in the form of a physical map/model of the Parish with its main geographical features. It would also include the names and locations of the dwellings of each man who was killed from the Parish during WW1. WW2 information will also be included. The plaque will echo those already placed in some of our buildings by previous generations

The plaque can become part of the visual landscape of some of the 'public' buildings within the Parish. It will measure some 84cms by 60 cms. It would be a resin-based, 'cold-cast bronze'created by a specialist artist from within the Parish.

The plaque is designed to act as a focal point for members of the Parish and the general public. It would be linked to a series of Heritage Trails making use of our well-used, existing and extensive footpath networks.




