#### **Curry Rivel Active Travel Cycle Footpath**

t a special meeting on 18th January, the Parish Council unanimously agreed to the recommendations for the design and route of the Active Travel Cycle Footpath and gave the go ahead for the working group to explore the next steps.

The final route along with the recommended design requirements is now available on the Curry Rivel Website https://www.curryrivel.org.uk/campaigns/cyclefootpath.html.

This route will only become possible with the support of landowners and to date we have had encouraging conversations with some Landowners namely, Ron Bracken, Sylvia Grace, and Tim Schroder. Further discussions are still required with others.

Whilst the drawings show the preferred route, there is still much to be done before we can be sure that a path is viable and can proceed.

The Working Group will actively seek out sources of funding from local authorities, the Active Travel Fund (headed by Chris Boardman) as well as seek voluntary donations from our community. So now is a great time to be pressing ahead with the project.

The Somerset County Council Transport Manager has taken a particular interest in this project because of its rural based nature and because it could eventually link to other villages. Watch this space for further updates and please write in with messages of support as, without doubt, we will need to show evidence when the time comes to seek funding. #### **Change in Local Government – update**

urther to the article by District & County Councillor Clare Paul and District Councillor Tiffany Osborne in the last issue, things are progressing with reorganisation into a single Somerset Council.

The Local Government Review (LGR) Advisory Board held a successful public meeting on 3<sup>rd</sup> February, and the LGR Joint Committee met on 4<sup>th</sup> to take several decisions on progressing the set-up of the new Council. The Committee includes representatives of all four District Councils and the County Council.

For Curry Rivel, an important aspect will be its membership of a Local Community Network (LCN) of some 15-20 parish councils within the new Somerset Council. Current plans are that these LCNs will cover most issues, but not planning; possible boundaries for them are currently under discussion, with Curry Rivel faced with deciding whether to join with its larger neighbours to the east, or with its smaller neighbours to the west, north and south.

There will now be two elected councillors to represent the Curry Rivel & Langport Ward, with the elections being held on the 5<sup>th</sup> of May alongside the Curry Rivel Parish Council elections.

The Liberal Democrat candidates will be Richard Wilkins and Mike Stanton. Richard is a member of Curry Rivel Parish Council, having lived in the village for 10 years with his partner Kate. Mike has been the District Councillor for Burrow Hill Ward (Kingsbury Episcopi, Drayton, Muchelney, Hambridge) since May 2019, is Vice-chair of Area North Committee and a member of the Somerset Rivers Authority; he lives in South Petherton.

The Green Party candidates will be Matt Geen and Stephen Tate. Matt is a Curry Rivel Parish councillor, who has lived in the village for 10 years and was brought up nearby. Stephen is chair or Langport Town Council and lives in Langport.

The Labour candidate will be Sean Dromgoole. Sean has lived just outside Langport since 1999. Sean is a town councillor in Langport and President and groundsman of Huish and Langport Cricket club. Sean has twice run for national Parliament and during lockdown helped Black Sheep Butchers offer a delivery service for those who were shielding.

Any other candidates will be announced in due course.



he February speaker for programme of talks at the Somerton u3a monthly meeting was Lottie Dale who entertained members with her account of being a member of a women's free fall parachute team in the 80s and 90s.

Lottie entertained over 100 members at the Edgar Hall with tales of her parachuting career, spanning 17 years and making over 1,700 jumps. Inspired by her Spitfire flying father, Lottie yearned to fly but as that ambition was out of reach, she took up parachute jumping. Lottie fell in love with it and was soon learning to manoeuvre in the air and linking up to other people to make shapes in the sky. She joined a group, was soon entering competitions in the UK and Europe doing free fall jumps linked to up to 60 people.

Fabulous stitching of birds, bees, flowers, people, landscapes, many interwoven with fine single threads of silver or gold lacing their way through scenes. It really was a feast for the eyes, especially seeing it being worked on in situ (see photo) and on hearing the exhibition was soon to end, I arranged to take two of my

granddaughters to see it. Aged 11 and 12, they gleefully took lots of photos, especially as more and more intricacies were pointed out to them. I felt that even if they weren't quite as excited by it as I was, they might realise it's full beauty in the future and be proud that they had seen it 'in the flesh'......I hope so anyway.

If it comes our way again, I thoroughly recommend a viewing.....I shall certainly be first in line!

#### **County Council News**

Coronavirus infection rates: As of 28<sup>th</sup> January the number of confirmed Covid cases in Somerset was 106,569 (27% up from 83,300 on 30<sup>th</sup> December) and the number of Covid-attributed deaths 977. The rate per 100,000 stands at 964.2 (766.6) for Somerset with Mendip at 766.5 (892.0), Sedgemoor at 1143.1 (756.6), South Somerset 921.3 (684.3) and SW&T at 1016.0 (770.4). The number of total deaths across the County is currently below the 5-year average and the latest R-value for Somerset is between 0.8 and 1.1 Infection rates in Somerset continue to be extremely high. With the new omicron variant it is still advisable, even for those who have had both jabs and the relaxation in Government guidelines to continue to observe social distancing and to always ventilate indoor areas.

**Somerset Coronavirus Support Helpline:** A single phone number continues to be available for anyone in Somerset who needs Coronavirus-related support. **0300 790 6275**, is open seven days a week from 8am to 6pm.

**Vaccination programmes roll-out**: Somerset continues to have one of the highest vaccination rates in the country with the latest figures showing over 96.2% of the 18+ population having had one dose of vaccine and 93.8% having had both doses. In total 63.7% of the adult population have also received their booster.

**Local Government Reorganisation:** Following the Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) decision to support the move to a single Unitary Council across Somerset the Structural Changes Order was laid before Parliament on 24<sup>th</sup> January. The agreed vesting date remains 1<sup>st</sup> April 2023. The first elections to the new authority together with Somerset Town and Parish elections will be held on 5th May 2022.

County Council Revenue Budget: Somerset County Council has published its last draft proposed budget ahead of the creation of a new unitary Somerset Council in April 2023. The council is proposing major increases in investment in care services, with an increase for Adult Social Care of £18m (13%), and over £12m (also 13%) for Children's Services. The increase in funding for Adult Social Care in part reflects the council's recent decision to support an increase in carers pay and to provide a retention bonus for care staff in Somerset. This is intended to support the recruitment and retention of staff in a challenging job market for care services.

**County Council Capital Budget:** SCC is proposing to allocate £48 million for capital spending in the coming year. This includes substantial investment in measures to tackle climate change, building on the council's successful Climate Emergency Community Fund. The council has allocated £1 million in new match funding to support the

"decarbonisation" of schools – on top of the existing £7.8 million investment in decarbonising the council's buildings, including libraries. A further £1 million has been allocated for electric fleet vehicles and charging infrastructure. A new investment of £1 million has been allocated to local transport schemes.

**Proposed Council Tax:** Council Tax for SCC is proposed to rise by two per cent with a further one per cent rise for the social care precept. This compares to UK inflation in December running at over four percent and will mean that Somerset County Council continues to set one of the lowest County Tax rates in the UK.

**Somerset libraries:** Since libraries reopened their doors last April, Somerset Libraries have had over half a million visits and have welcomed over 16,000 new members. To encourage even more people to reconnect with library services and support communities as they start to recover from the impact of the pandemic Somerset Libraries is running two initiatives until the 31<sup>st</sup> March. Children and young people aged 17 and under will not be charged for using any library services. This includes requesting books from other libraries, borrowing DVDs and no charges for the late return of items! The service will also be happy to clear outstanding charges, for all customers, incurred before 21<sup>st</sup> January 2022, no questions asked. To take advantage of this 'welcome back' offer, visit your local library before the 31<sup>st</sup> March and speak to a member of staff.

Climate change action 1: Somerset County Council has been ranked as the top county council in the UK when it comes to taking a lead on climate change. Climate Emergency UK has ranked all 409 local authorities, scoring them against nine categories, including how well councils' plans would mitigate the impact of climate change locally, whether the climate and ecological emergency was integrated into existing policies, community engagement, climate education, scale of emissions targets, and commitments to tackle the ecological emergency. Somerset County Council was named as the top county council, meanwhile Somerset West & Taunton Council was ranked as the top district council

Climate change action 2: A grant available to help Somerset people benefit from energy efficient installations worth up to £10,000 has been extended until June 2022. The Green Homes Grant Scheme allows eligible homeowners to apply for vouchers to install climate-friendly energy saving measures such as insulation, air source heat pumps, or double glazing. The work can be worth up to £10,000, with nothing for homeowners to pay towards the cost of the works. To be eligible for the grants, the residents of the property must have a low income and the Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) for the property must be rated D, E, F or G. visit <a href="https://www.heatsomerset.co.uk">www.heatsomerset.co.uk</a> for more information.



Until we see the truth of something for ourselves, either by witnessing it or testing it, we cannot say that we know something.

There's a Bible passage that shows this is nothing new. When Jesus was beginning his public ministry, the town he came from had a bad reputation. Nazareth was not seen as a des-res. So when Jesus called Philip to be one of his disciples, and Philip went to his friend Nathanael to tell him that they'd found "Jesus, son of Joseph from Nazareth" his response was less than Nathanael said "Can enthusiastic. anvthina good come out of Nazareth?" Before he'd even seen, met or heard Jesus, Nathanael had made his mind up. Nazareth? No way!

You can read the full account in John's Gospel (Ch. 1 verses 43 to 51) but the short version is that when Nathanael actually met Jesus, the preconceived negatives quickly slipped away. So what's my point? Well as the vicar I wonder sometimes whether many negative views about Christians and the church are also largely based on hearsay and preconceived ideas that are endlessly reinforced and repeated -things said by those who actually have no first-hand experience themselves. I'm only guessing really because people are usually quite restrained around vicars (!), but perhaps the word on the street, or in your WhatsApp group, is that the Christian faith is irrelevant to modern life, that Christians live in cloud -cuckoo land believing impossible things based on thin air; that the welcome at church would be lacking even unfriendly, that the atmosphere would be cliquey, that people would point and laugh if you didn't know what was going on or what to do, and that far from being a place of warmth, love and acceptance there would be judgement.

When people investigated for themselves, Picasso turned out **not** to be a lefty. When Nathanael met Jesus of Nazareth, his prejudices slipped away.

Could it be that what you've heard about Christians and the church may similarly be less than reliable? As Philip did for Nathanael, can I warmly invite you to 'come and see'?



#### LENT at the URC Giving something to (rather than giving something up) You are invited to Morning Coffee on Saturday 9th April URC Hall 10am-12 noon

You've heard the familiar phrase "giving something up for Lent" - it originates with the solemn Christian observance of fasting and the giving up of luxuries in order to replicate, remind ourselves by entering into the spirit of, Jesus's time spent in the desert at the beginning of his public ministry. The Gospels record this period in the desert as 40 days - hence Lent (and any giving up we might do) lasts for 40 days (weekends don't count!). This year the beginning of Lent (Ash Wednesday) falls on March 2<sup>nd</sup> ending approximately six weeks later, Holy Saturday (16th April), the day before Easter Sunday.

Lent is a season of preparation: preparation for Christ's death and resurrection - preparation through prayer; repentance (or sorrow for) of sins (unhelpful acts or inaction); penance (putting right or making amends for a wrong); almsgiving (charitable giving to those in need); the denial of ego (self-denial; usually denying oneself the pleasures of life but also a recognition of others needs as more important than our own).

# Jobs to do in the Garden in March A very busy time for Gardeners!

- Start sowing vegetable seeds in a cold frame or greenhouse.
- Start sweetpea seeds if not done on the autumn they can be in a cold greenhouse.
- Sow tomato, chilli, aubergine and sweet pepper seeds indoors.
- Finish pruning roses early in the month.
- Divide perennials that have become too large , the middles will die back otherwise.
- Tidy up your borders. Weed and mulch before plants put on too much growth.
- Plant new roses, shrubs and climbers.
- Deadhead any daffodilss and other spring bulbs that have finished flowering but let the leaves die back naturally.

# We've been busy at the Curry Woods

**Conservation Trust**

This collection of pictures gives a snapshot of our work over the winter months. We have planted 400 more trees and shrubs. Both the Curry Rivel school and the CR WI took part on a wonderful Wednesday in January.

The WI contingent planted their Centenary Grove, which should become a fitting celebration of 100 years of the local branch. We got most of the trees planted then and the rest came in dribs and drabs during late January/early February. Many thanks to all the school staff, young people and experienced others who did a sterling job.



Also during the same week Clive Bethell laid the hedge along the southern boundary. This has attracted some comment as those who have never seen a hedge laid in the traditional manner think it has been decimated. This is sort of literally true as only about 10% of the starting hedge has been retained and the rest cut out. This traditional way of thickening up a hedge uses the fact that hedgerow trees can be cut down or coppiced and this induces thicker growth, both from the remaining stems and also from the rootstock.

It is up to us now to cultivate the hedge so that it forms a thick, bird friendly hedge rather than the leggy thin hedges produced by flailing. The aim will be to have a hedge with a "batter". This is a traditional sloping shape
