



### **Active Travel Update**

In 2021 you helped raised £14000 to cover the cost of the research and to produce a design and route. Following two years of negotiation with Landowners and councils, the project is close to reaching agreement and now needs to raise the finance to begin the task of clearing land and constructing the path between Curry Rivel and Langport.

The outline map of the planned route.



We will of course be seeking funding from the local council and approaching several other organisations for grants.

However, we will need to raise a minimum of £50,000 from the community and other sources. All monies will go towards the cost of clearing the areas (which are very overgrown on two sections) and to construct a resilient path suitable for walking, cycling, prams and buggies, scooters, wheelchairs and motability.

The existing busy stretch of the A378 between Curry Rivel and Langport is unsuitable for cyclists and pedestrians due to being very narrow in places and the volume and speed of traffic. Residents of Curry Rivel and surrounding villages rely on amenities in Langport and Huish Episcopi such as local shops and businesses, doctors, the library, the secondary school and Huish Leisure Centre, but the vast majority use their cars to travel there and back.

The need for an improved transport link is clear and the proposed project would bring a wide range of benefits to cyclists, pedestrians and the wider community, for example:

- an accessible, safe and traffic free path for cyclists and pedestrians
- increased opportunities for exercise, contributing to a healthy lifestyle
- reduction in volume of traffic and dangerous emissions on this stretch of the A378
- increased trade for local shops and businesses
- a link to a possible future rail station at Langport
- a solution to the need for a safe route for students to get to the school, academy and leisure centre

The project is now being taken forward by a small group of volunteers who are investigating feasibility, possible routes for the path, and funding opportunities. As the grant has been awarded to the project on a matched funding basis, the group are now seeking financial and other support from a wide range of sources including councils, businesses and voluntary organisations, as well as the public.

### **CRPC Heating Initiatives**

Curry

Village meeting, Thursday, 12<sup>th</sup> October at 5.30 pm, Old School Room, Curry Rivel

he way that we Rivel heat our houses in Curry Rivel has **Parish** become a major issue. The village has been identified as a hot spot of fuel poverty (the gap between the cost of energy and the ability of people to pay for it). The news is filled with stories of the world's climate becoming more extreme, and most scientists who have studied this agree that it is related to increasing amounts of carbon dioxide in the air.

About half of the carbon



dioxide that we generate in Curry Rivel comes from heating our houses. So, when Somerset County Council offered grants to local councils to address climate change, Curry Rivel Parish Council bid for, and was awarded, money to have a detailed look at heating in the village.

On Thursday, October 12<sup>th</sup> 2023, from 5.30 p.m. to 8.30 p.m., in the Old School Room, Church Road, Curry Rivel, TA10 0HQ, the Heating Initiatives project team are holding a meeting to present the findings of the project to the village, in collaboration with other



Somerset organisations who are working in this area. You are welcome to drop in at any time.

The technology of heating, and the financial aspects (costs, grants), are changing fast, and we all need expert advice. Many of the houses in the village might not be immediately suitable for fitting new heating systems, and insulation is a big part of the solution. The buzzword that applies here is "retrofit".

The Parish Council contracted RenewEV Ltd. to report on heating in the village and make suggestions. Their report can be downloaded from <a href="https://www.curryrivel.org.uk/campaigns/heating-initiatives-project.html">https://www.curryrivel.org.uk/campaigns/heating-initiatives-project.html</a>. RenewEV will present their findings and answer questions. We have also invited several other organisations that are working to give advice on energy and heating to people in Somerset.

The experts will be on hand from 5.30 p.m. to give advice. A series of short talks and presentations will be given at



7.30 p.m., followed by questions and discussion. The event will finish at 8.30pm.

### The Launch of the Somerset Tree Strategy

The latest news from Curry Woods Conservation Trust

ten-year plan to enhance and protect Somerset trees and woodland has been proposed by a consortium of organisations led by Somerset County Council. Thankfully at last one of the council's priorities is to put our money (that's us the taxpayers) to create a greener, more sustainable Somerset. The strategy recognises their essential role in helping to tackle the crises of climate change and biodiversity loss. A partnership has been established between the Environment Agency, Somerset Local Nature Partnership, Exmoor National Park, Quantock Hills, AONB partnership, Forestry Commission and the Woodland Trust.

As I have pointed out in previous articles about our Trust, Somerset has 8% tree cover, much less than the national average and southern Somerset has even less than that. The Curry Woods and their connection to the woodland running along the escarpment above the West Sedgemoor wetland area form an ecological corridor, allowing animal and plants to migrate without human interference. Although this came about as a happy accident because of the steepness of the slope, much effort has been made in the past to cultivate as close as possible to the steepest slopes, thus making the corridor narrow. Now is the time to expand this corridor and plant in such a way as to capture carbon, help to ameliorate the chance of you burning in the summer, soak up water in summer and winter, help to stop the chances of you flooding and to greatly increase the biodiversity; giving some hope that your grandchildren will be able to understand the cycle of life and the role plants (in particular as they produce all our oxygen and food) and animals play in it.

Work is already under way with the creation of three new posts, with funding assured by DEFRA. In particular, their roles will be to support existing tree groups (like us) and encourage new ones. The full tree strategy is available on the Somerset Council website.

#### The five themes are:

- Create a wood culture enabling everyone to understand the importance of trees to the county, its natural environment and its communities.
- Make our trees more resilient and adaptable by protecting, expanding, managing and diversifying our existing treescapes.
- Expand tree coverage in Somerset.
- Create a range of services and products.
- Create a sustainable and flexible governance structure.



As many will recognise, these themes, especially the first three, have formed the backbone of what I have been arguing for in CR since 2016. You have all responded magnificently and I thank you for your support. We were ahead of the game and have, by establishing the charity and setting up the Trust, put our community at the very front of this ambitious strategy. We have already established a good working relationship with the new post holders and will be working hard to identify new areas to plant trees and increase biodiversity in Curry Rivel. We have worked together to already identified SCC land which may form the next area to be planted.

Finally, please visit the Trust land and as you walk the footpath look for the large anthills alongside the path. This is the increase in biodiversity happening already. There are now many anthills across the site and these form an important food source for yaffles (green woodpeckers – Britain's largest woodpecker). Is it a coincidence that I have seen an increase in young yaffles in the last two years? I don't think so.

I look forward to writing about the progress of this vital work over the next few months. Meantime, check out our website:

#### **BYGONE DAYS**



# This curious tale from the *Tαunton Courier* raises all sorts of questions:

An American sailor, who had lost part of his left arm and the flesh of his right, was apprehended on Wednesday at Ilminster charged with robbing a young woman of the name of Laver, of Curry Rivel on Tuesday last, of a bundle of clothes, and her pocket, containing some silver and other articles. Having clasped her neck with the stump of his left arm, he took a knife from his pocket with his hand, and opening it between his teeth,

threatened to murder her if she made the least noise. He was examined on Wednesday last and committee the following day to Wilton Gaol, his person being sworn to by the girl. *Taunton Courier*, Thursday 14 August 1817.

So, who was this 'American sailor', and what was he doing in Ilminster? How did come by his injuries? Did they bother with an identity parade?



### The Forget-Me-Not Café Needs you!!



# 'Learn from the Master' A recent article by our Diocesan Bishop Michael Beasly

When you hear the word 'disciple', what comes into your mind? A learner? A follower? A super Christian? Someone kitted out in Biblical dress complete with robe, sandals, tea towel head covering and beard?

The New Testament's word for disciple doesn't quite match any of these descriptions. It's much closer to the word we'd use in English for 'apprentice'.

Back in history, and still today, to be an apprentice meant spending time in the presence of a master in order to learn a craft - maybe carpentry, or blacksmithing, baking or butchery. You'd start out doing the simple stuff sweeping floors or sharpening tools. Then gradually you'd acquire more and more skills until you learnt to work confidently with materials producing beautiful things, products of utility and worth. Apprentices often learnt their craft while living alongside their masters, becoming members of their trade through time spent together at work and rest and play.

Jesus was often called 'the carpenter's son' – apprenticed to his worldly father Joseph, growing in skill at the plane and the lathe. He was also the apprentice of his heavenly father. The Gospels speak of Jesus withdrawing to spend time with God in order to know God's mind, hear God's voice, grow in God's ways.

Apprenticeship was and is a story of growth, development, discovery and change. It's the journey that Jesus invites us to take with him too – of baby steps and toddler stumbles, of emerging skill and increasing understanding.

Inspired by his great uncle Thomas Picher a well-known water -colourist of south England landscapes whose paintings hung in the family house, David has always painted in situ.




